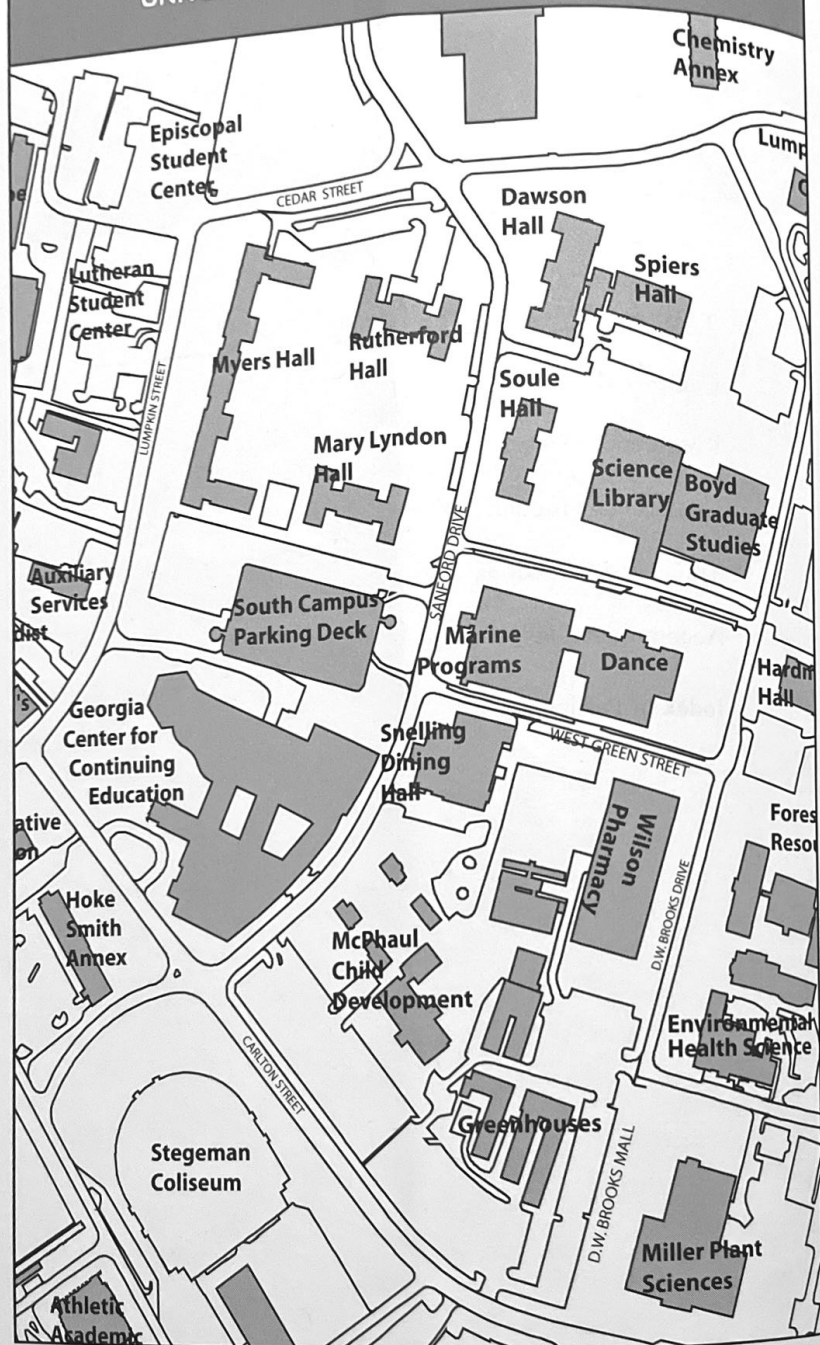

TRAVEL AND DIRECTIONS

TRANSPORTATION

Those traveling by air have two choices. The largest number of (and in most cases the cheapest) flights are available into Atlanta’s Hartsfield Airport, which is located roughly 75 miles from the University of Georgia. Those using this option may either rent a car or book a shuttle to get from the airport to the conference site. The normal one-way fare for a shuttle is \$30 per person through AAA Airport Express (1-800-354-7874). There will be a limited number of shuttles offered at \$20 per person one-way on Thursday, June 20, and Friday, June 21, coming from the airport and Sunday, June 23, going to the airport. These shuttles must be reserved through the normal registration process.

The second choice for air travel is to the Ben Epps Airport in Athens, which is located less than five miles from campus. People may take US Air into Charlotte, North Carolina and then a US Air commuter flight into Athens. Rental cars and taxis are available at the airport in Athens.

PARKING

Parking is available in a parking deck next to the Georgia Center for \$10 per 24-hour period. Conferees staying at the Georgia Center may pay for parking as part of their housing bill. There are also two pay lots on the campus: the University Bookstore/Tate Student Center and the parking deck beside the Georgia Center for Continuing Education, both of which may be entered from Lumpkin Street.

ACCOMMODATIONS

Single and double rooms are available at reasonable prices at the Georgia Center for Continuing Education, which is also the locale of all conference and symposium sessions. Please inform the person taking your reservation that you are attending the SHAFR conference or the symposium on "The South and Globalization."

Another choice to stay on campus is in a dorm, either Soule Hall, located across the street behind the Georgia Center, or Mary Lyndon Hall, also behind the Center. All rooms must be reserved through conference or symposium registration by May 30, 2002. All rooms in the dorms can accommodate at least two people, and suites can accommodate as many as four. Linens are provided. Rates for one night are as follows:

Soule Hall

One person per room, \$33.25

More than one per room, suite, \$23.75

Mary Lyndon Hall

One person per room, \$30.50

More than one person per room/suite, \$22.00

Limited space is available at both the Georgia Center and in the two dorms. It is a good idea to book as far in advance as possible.

Conferees wishing to stay in a dorm must make their reservations, with payment by check or money order, with their registration for the conference. The deadline is May 30.

The Holiday Inn Express, located about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from the Georgia Center for Continuing Education, is another nearby option.

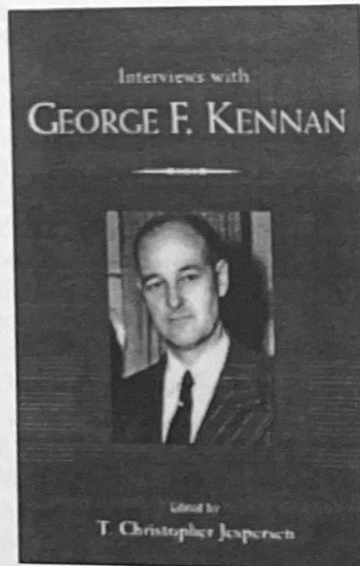

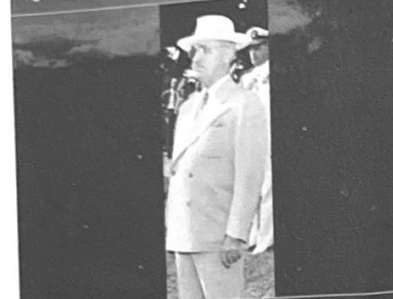
